## FFA COMPETITION RESULTS

The Banner County FFA recently competed at WNCC in several events, including livestock management, floriculture, and welding. The students took multiple tests, hoping to qualify for the state competition.

One of the categories in which the students competed was floriculture. Braedyn Bojorquez, Gianni Green, Hayden Mathiason, and Wilbur Reichenberg represented Banner County School in this competition. In floriculture, students take two tests: one to identify plants and a second to understand plant labels and how to care for plants. Additionally, students must create an overall design for a floral arrangement.

The second category was welding. Participants in this event were Blake Green, Kambree Hottell, Leigh McGowan, and Micah Dittbenner. This event requires taking an exam and then being assigned to different welding processes, such as stick, TIG, and oxy-acetylene (or other auxiliary) welding. After welding, the work is inspected and graded based on weld quality and the exam score.

Livestock management was the final category. Students who participated in this event were Austin West, Karlye Dittbenner, Kassie Loutzenhiser, Luke Olsen, Shawnie Mason, and Tate Olsen. The students studied categories such as horses, sheep, pigs, and beef and took one exam covering all these areas.

Representing the teams and students who placed were Kambree Hottell, who placed first in welding, and Gianni Green, who placed 18th overall individually and received a red ribbon in floriculture. The welding team placed sixth overall and is now focusing on the next competition in February. We wish them luck. – by Hayden Mathiason



# Wrestling for State

With district wrestling approaching, they are preparing for one of the most important tournaments of the season, which could qualify them for state.

As for the wrestlers' goals this season, Wilbur and Tate have both stated that they want to qualify for and place at the state tournament. Even though the wrestlers have ambitious goals, Coach Olsen said his main expectation for them was simply: "To get better every day." Wilbur plans to reach his goal of placing at state by increasing the effort he puts into his wrestling; this is his main focus. Tate plans to achieve his goal by improving his ability to escape and score from the bottom, so he is concentrating on that skill during practice.

Despite the wrestlers' winning records, they still face some key challenges. For example, practice can be difficult because of the limited number of participants. For Tate, "going up against older kids with more experience" has been his greatest challenge this season. For Wilbur, his main challenge has been maintaining his confidence after wins and losses. Coach Olsen is working to improve two key areas for the team right now: overall mental toughness and the ability to handle adversity on the mat.

Ultimately, the wrestling season is underway, and the wrestlers are working to achieve the goals they set for themselves. Although they have faced some challenges, they are overcoming them and continually improving their skills. – by George Teeple

**Q: What are your plans for after high school?**


**A:** Work at Roux Reining Horses, then study Equine Science at Central Wyoming College.

## *Students Shine at Panhandle Honor Band*

## **The Future of 3D Printing**

In October, Banner County received a new 3D printer. The printer was granted to Mr. Lemoine and his science, engineering, and technology students. With the 3D printer, students will be able to create projects, prototype and improve their designs, problem-solve, design parts, test ideas, and make improvements—for example, a hand crank that Mr. Lemoine and his class repaired. They will also be able to see the results of their projects in real time.

To obtain the printer, Mr. Lemoine applied for funding and purchased it through a Perkins Career and Technical Education (CTE) grant. It took a few months from applying for the grant to actually receiving the printer. Mr. Lemoine wanted the printer to give students better access to more modern equipment. According to Mr. Lemoine, “There are some major differences between the new and old printers. The old printer was a MakerBot Mini+; it was good for basic prints and learning fundamentals. The new printer is the Bambu Lab H2D; it is faster and better for more complex and advanced prints.”

With this printer, the students will have the opportunity to create and build more complex and ambitious projects, such as the chessboard the engineering class created or the hand-crank handle they produced for the science class to use. We can’t wait to see what the students create with the new printer!
